

We work with our partners overseas to make all our projects inclusive, ensuring that everyone, everywhere can access a good life. Reaching people with disabilities is vital as too often they are excluded from opportunities and services – but this is now changing in the places we work thanks to you.







Five-year-old Malia in South Sudan received life-saving surgery and therapy for her recovery. She now attends school where she is working hard to one day become a doctor! Elvis in Zambia received a wheelchair, and with it the ability to attend skills-training classes with our local partners. He now grows multiple crops, the sales of which provide an income for him and his family. And in Malawi, our partners have been working in Baison's community to help change attitudes. We work with police and local authorities to fight stigma and bring perpetrators of violence against people with albinism to justice.



In 1965, SCIAF was founded in a Rutherglen classroom by Monsignor John Rooney and volunteer John McKee. Their aim, which we still live by today, was to help people in the world's poorest places and inspire Scottish Catholics to respond to the Gospel's call for a just world.

Thanks to your dedicated support, and the love of generations before you, this is what the SCIAF family has managed to achieve since then.



We joined Make **Poverty History** and campaigned to 'Make Aid Work' at the G8 Summit in Gleneagles.

We launched an urgent appeal for refugees fleeing conflict in Syria, **supporting over** 43,000 people. In the same year, we also strengthened our Board by creating new positions for lay people and three expert sub-committees.



By raising your voice, you helped convince the Scottish Government to become the first in the world to commit funding for Loss and Damage, making a huge impact at COP26 talks in Glasgow.

We provided emergency relief in the Holv Land and welcomed the only Catholic Priest in Gaza to Glasgow.

Why I volunteer

What does a Parish Contact do?

Well, in our parish, I am the one who co-ordinates fundraising events like the 200 Club, and leads on promoting SCIAF's work. So that could mean arranging a coffee morning or afternoon tea for an appeal. I'll put posters up and leave SCIAF prayers at the back of Church. And I'll also help with the Real Gifts stall at Christmas – those sorts of things.

Tell us about some of your favourite fundraising events...

We've held several 'Junior Bake Offs' in the past which were so lovely in bringing the parish together and involving younger people. Guest judges from SCIAF enjoyed the tasting! Of course, anything with wine seems to go down well, too. Finally, our Alternativity Lunch during Advent is a special one, where we reflect, learn about issues in the world, and eat a simple meal together.

Do you receive much support from SCIAF?

Jenna from the SCIAF Engagement Team is always on hand – and she comes along to update parishioners about SCIAF appeals and thank them for their kind donations. At our parish, we've set up an Outreach Team, so there's lots of enthusiastic people to help with charitable events.

It's part of our faith to support those who are in need, wherever they are in the world. Being a Parish Contact allows me to live out my faith – and I'd encourage anyone to take up this role!

Hi, I'm Bailey, one of the founders of the Caritas Cup, an initiative started five years ago at St Margaret's High School in Airdrie. In our 6th Year, my three friends and I were working on the Caritas Award - but we wanted to do something different with it. And that's how the Caritas Cup kicked off!

Its purpose was to unite communities and schools in their shared Catholic faith through sports, namely football and netball. And this mission still holds strong today. Thousands of pupils from across Scotland - and now in other parts of the world - play sport together, with faith at the forefront.

Striking out to Rome

In June this year, ten young men from the Diocese of Motherwell took the Caritas Cup to Rome for the Jubilee of Sport. This was a wonderful occasion, with over 800,000 people participating in various activities.

We met with people from all different areas of the Church and ended the trip with a football festival, with players from all over Europe. Being able to see the

new Pope in The Vatican was a brilliant and moving moment for us all.

Plans are now in place for the Caritas Cup to develop in many countries and continents around the world. We are truly humbled by this and thank God for the blessing that this project has received.

CANCEL DEBT TO CHOOSE HOPE

Right now, many of the world's poorest countries are trapped in a spiralling debt crisis. Countries like Zambia and Malawi are forced to spend more on repaying debt than on healthcare or education for their people. That's not right!

Our Jubilee Year campaign, Cancel Debt, Choose Hope, calls on world leaders to cancel these unfair debts, change debt systems and offer real support to communities in need.



ZAMBIA'S JOURNEY INTO UNFAIR DEBT

Every country's path into debt is different, shaped by history, global events, and decisions made far from the people most affected. But one story helps us understand how the crisis has unfolded.

Here's how Zambia ended up in debt:



Zambia was paying \$377 million a year to repay its debts, more than it spent on healthcare. At the same time. 9 million people were living on less than \$2 a day.

In February, our International Accountant Lee Dornan hit the headlines after he scaled Arthur's Seat in Edinburgh. He carried a huge sack of debt on his back to demonstrate the uphill struggle many of the poorest countries face.

Lee said: "By campaigning for change, we can cancel debt and choose hope. We want as many people as possible sign the petition."

VAIDA'S STORY

"As I grew up, walking became really difficult. I couldn't go anywhere – it was frustrating because, like any child, I wanted to move around. I was a burden as people had to carry me; it made me feel really bad.

"I was given a tricycle, as well as an elbow crutch, my school uniform, menstrual pads and soap. SEM staff visit me regularly to do therapy on my legs, which is why I'm now able to move around using the crutch!

"At school, I feel smart in my school uniform. The sanitary pads and soap have allowed me to stay in school too. We used to buy menstrual products from the market – but when there was no money, it meant that I missed school due to my periods.

"I want to say a big thank you to SCIAF and SEM who have helped me with all these things. If it was not for their presence in my life, I would have been so miserable. May God bless them and allow them to continue helping others in need."

THE KUMENA PROJECT

'Dignity' showcases the incredible impact of the Kumena Project in Zambia. Over six years, it supported 1,588 of the poorest farming families - and it was only possible thanks to your support and funding from the Scottish Government.

The project was hugely successful and made real, lasting change for everyone involved. Families learned new ways to farm, earn income, build energysaving stoves, and produce eco-friendly charcoal. Kumena also championed the wellbeing and rights of women and girls - boosting school attendance and

Reflecting on SCIAF's impact

Dr Duncan MacLaren was the first full-time employee of SCIAF and the first SCIAF Director. He is now a member of SCIAF's Integral Human **Development Advisory Group and was made a Knight Commander of** St Gregory the Great by Pope Francis in 2016 for his work for the Church.





I was initially employed as SCIAF's Education Officer to go round parishes and schools to inform them of the agency's work and advocate on behalf of the poor. I remember that my first call was from a head teacher who used some outdated language to talk about SCIAF's work. I realised a lot had to change.

Soon after, Lyisited CAFOD in London and Trócaire in Dublin where it became clear that we had to set up a small professional team at SCIAF and move away from doing solely missionary projects. We needed to promote partnership, embrace Catholic Social Teaching and become professional - but always with, as Pope Benedict XVI later wrote, 'a heart that sees'.

The Scottish Bishops' Conference was persuaded, and, for the rest of my 13year tenure, I saw the emergence of a butterfly from a chrysalis. We built a small but brilliant staff team, joined Caritas and CIDSE, and became - in the words of the very supportive Cardinal Thomas Winning - 'the jewel of the Scottish Church'.

Sixty years on, SCIAF is an internationally respected aid, development and advocacy agency cherished by the Scottish Government: its peers in Caritas Europa. CIDSE and Caritas Internationalis; by our Bishops' Conference and the Catholic

community - priests, religious and the laity; and by the youngsters in our schools whose enthusiam keeps us all going.

Above all, our staff are our main witnesses to our professionalism by acting in close affective solidarity with our partners around the world, trying together to transform the lives of the poorest, All the time, SCIAF follows integral human development principles arising from the social teaching of the Church, founded on scripture and embellished by the tradition of the Church over centuries - and today fostered in our own era by Pope Francis and now Pope Leo XIV.

As I look proudly on at the accolades being showered on SCIAF in its sixtieth year, Pope Francis's words come to mind: "An authentic faith always involves a deep desire to change the world, to transmit values, to leave the earth somehow better than we found it."


