In Scotland, many people use allotments - small plots of land to grow vegetables, fruits, and herbs.

Around the world, especially in the poorest places, families rely on small vegetable gardens for most of their food. If they have any extra, they sell it at the market. These vegetable gardens often depend on rain for water, so extreme weather like droughts or floods can make it hard to grow enough food. And climate change is making extreme weather more common.

SCIAF's partners help families grow food to eat by teaching which plants grow best, how to look after them, and how to use eco-friendly methods like composting. Families also learn which seeds grow well with different amounts of rain and how to plant a mix of crops in case some don't grow. Families get gardening tools and watering cans, so they can use what they have learned to grow their own vegetables at home.

Jesus teaches us to love and care for everyone, especially those who are poor or left out. When we see someone in need, we are called to help, just like Jesus would. He showed us how to be kind, generous, and compassionate to everyone, no matter who they are. When we help our global neighbours, we are sharing Jesus' love and showing others that they are loved by God too.



Bees are really important minibeasts because they help plants grow by spreading pollen, which makes fruits, vegetables, and flowers. They also collect nectar from plants to make honey, which beekeepers can sell at local markets.

By learning to care for bees, people in some of the poorest countries are helping protect these vital bee populations and earning money to pay for essentials. Farmers learn how to set up beehives, take care of the bees, and safely collect honey.

Real Gifts make a world of difference. When you buy a Real Gift for a friend it brings them joy, and also provides real support for our sisters and brothers living in some of the world's poorest places. **But, don't just take our word for it!**

REAL GIFTS 0&A

Let's explore some important questions about how Real Gifts work. We encourage you to think critically and create your own set of questions as a class.

Ouestion:

Why would some people choose Real Gifts over a traditional present?

In Laudato Si', Pope Francis reminds us that "Purchasing is always a moral – and not simply economic – act." What we choose to spend our money on reflects our own values and beliefs. When we respond to the needs of others by buying Real Gifts, we are living out our faith.

Question:

How does SCIAF ensure that the Real Gifts are appropriate for the communities who receive them, and can these gifts potentially affect the local economies?

All Real Gifts support work that is already happening through SCIAF's partners worldwide. Our projects are led by the communities we serve, and our partners (usually the local Catholic Church). Before a project begins, we work with the community to identify their specific needs, such as growing more food or getting clean water.

We don't buy items like farming tools, watering cans, school books, or soap in Scotland to send abroad. Instead, our partners source them locally (except in emergencies) which boosts the local economy, reduces travel emissions, and ensures that the items are culturally appropriate and suitable for the community.

Question:

What are the benefits or drawbacks to this approach?

Real Gifts let communities decide what they need instead of us assuming what might help them. For example, well-meaning projects that send backpacks to children worldwide are often not sustainable, and can actually increase global inequality. These backpacks might be made cheaply in factories by poorly paid workers and filled with items that are not useful for the children receiving them. This shows why it's important to think about how we can help others in a way that respects human dignity and is sustainable.

Question:

What about the transparency of Real Gifts?

People in Scotland love Real Gifts because they provide a way to put faith into action while respecting the dignity of people living in poverty. We aim to be as transparent as possible with all donations, but it wouldn't be ethical to share the exact details of which communities received specific types of help, like farming tools or beekeeping projects.

Question:

Are Real Gifts truly ethical and sustainable?

Yes, Real Gifts are designed to be both ethical and sustainable, having a positive lasting impact on people in some of the world's poorest places. Do you agree?

THE LAUDATO SI' REAL GIFTS ARE THE REAL GIFTS OF VEGETABLE GARDENS AND BEEKEEPING.



We've chosen to highlight these gifts because they represent key areas of our work – poverty, hunger and long-term development projects. In Laudato Si', Pope Francis tells us that: "There are not two crises, one environmental and one social, but one complex crisis. The solution means we have to combat poverty, restore dignity to the excluded, and protect nature."
